# Coopers FOUNDATION

In the sixteen years since it began, the Coopers Foundation has grown to become a highly regarded philanthropic organisation in Australia, and while it proudly has its roots in Coopers Brewery, it has evolved into a well-recognised entity in its own right.

To reflect this, it was suggested that the Foundation could benefit from strong, new branding that further raises the profile of the organisation and gives it a distinctive, individual presence while still retaining a link to Coopers.

Having identified the need for a refresh, the Adelaide-based branding firm On Creative, with whom we've worked closely over many years, offered to design and donate the new logo as part of its ongoing support for the values and mission of the Foundation.

The brand refresh saw the removal of the bottle cap, to shift the focus away from beer, and the adoption of the classic Coopers typeface to strengthen both the connection to the company and the Foundation's own identity.

We look forward to rolling out the new logo and branding across all platforms in the 2022/23 financial year.

# 2021, – 2022 Chair's Report

02

**The *Coopers Foundation* distributed a record annual amount of more than \$760,000 to 25 charitable projects, taking the total donated since inception to \$6.574m, benefitting more than 340 projects.**

We were delighted to welcome Jasmin Barry-Keen as the new Executive Officer of the Foundation in September and thank the former officer Briony Neindorf for her four years of dedicated service, while she serves in another role at the Brewery.

As previously reported in 2021, Coopers Brewery has committed to donate 1.5% of pre-tax profits to the Foundation Investment Fund, resulting in \$470,000 being transferred for investment. This year saw the Fund lose some of its value at the end of the financial year due to its holdings in Australian equities, but the long-term outlook for these investments is sound.

The portfolio currently sits at \$9,106,655 and it is envisaged that this investment will provide income for the annual giving of the Foundation, for the next generation of custodians.

The Coopers Brewery staff have again generously donated over \$70,000 from their salaries and Teen Challenge SA and The Warrior Woman Foundation were supported in their name. These projects provide important mentoring and life skills education to young people.

Shareholders donated over \$154,000, either directly or as a deduction from dividends, supporting two charitable causes for women

seeking shelter from domestic violence, through Salt Care Ltd in the Shoalhaven area and CareWorks SA, teaching financial literacy.

The Sustainable Giving Grants of \$50,000 per annum are given to three charities at any one time, paid over a three-year period. This year Prison Fellowship Australia's *Extraordinary Lives* project was awarded the grant from the community and family support sector, helping children of prisoners to thrive. These children will be assigned a mentor to help counteract negative pressures towards unhealthy relationships, drugs, and alcohol. Through their Camp for Kids, children are given a chance to meet, build positive relationships and reduce their sense of isolation.

This charity joins Australian Literacy and Numeracy Foundation (ALNF) for youth education and Neuroblastoma for health and medical research. In 2022, a charity will be chosen from the youth education sector as ALNF has now received its full funding.



The 13th Foundation Golf Day was again held at Kooyonga Golf Club in May with 33 teams playing, of which thirteen were hole sponsors. Following the game, golfers were invited to a gala dinner where Coopers Brewery Director Rob Chapman interviewed Commissioner of Police Grant Stevens about his experience navigating South Australia through the Covid-19 State of Emergency.

Over \$158,000 was raised on the day - from team and sponsor income, donations and auctions - with the fundraising shared between Operation Flinders, supporting teens at risk through outback mentoring programs, and St John's Youth Services, providing young people with accommodation services.

I thank KPMG for the pro-bono work performed auditing the accounts and On:Creative for producing this annual report. I would also like to extend my thanks to our Executive Officer, Jasmin Barry-Keen, for her dedication and expertise in performing her role, our Board of Governors, the Investment Committee, our Patrons and the Coopers Brewery Board of Directors for their support.

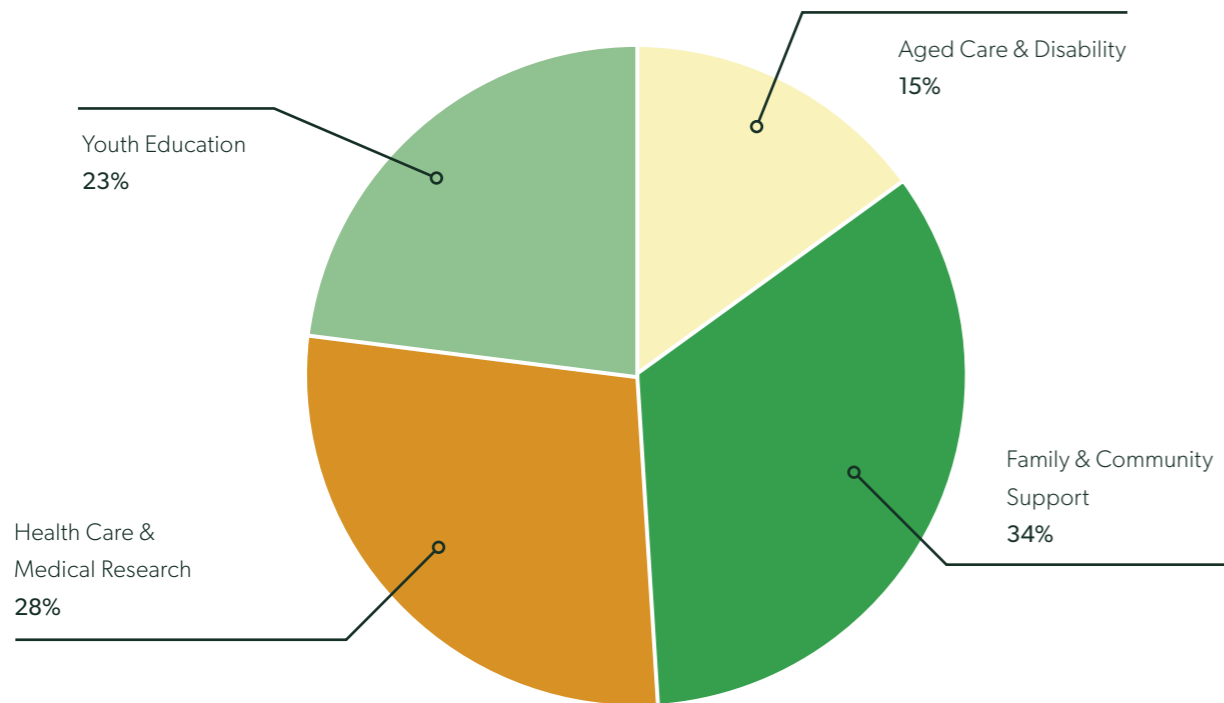

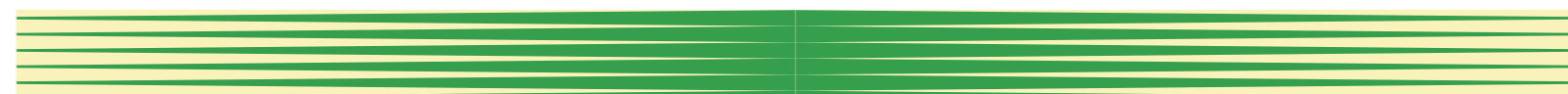
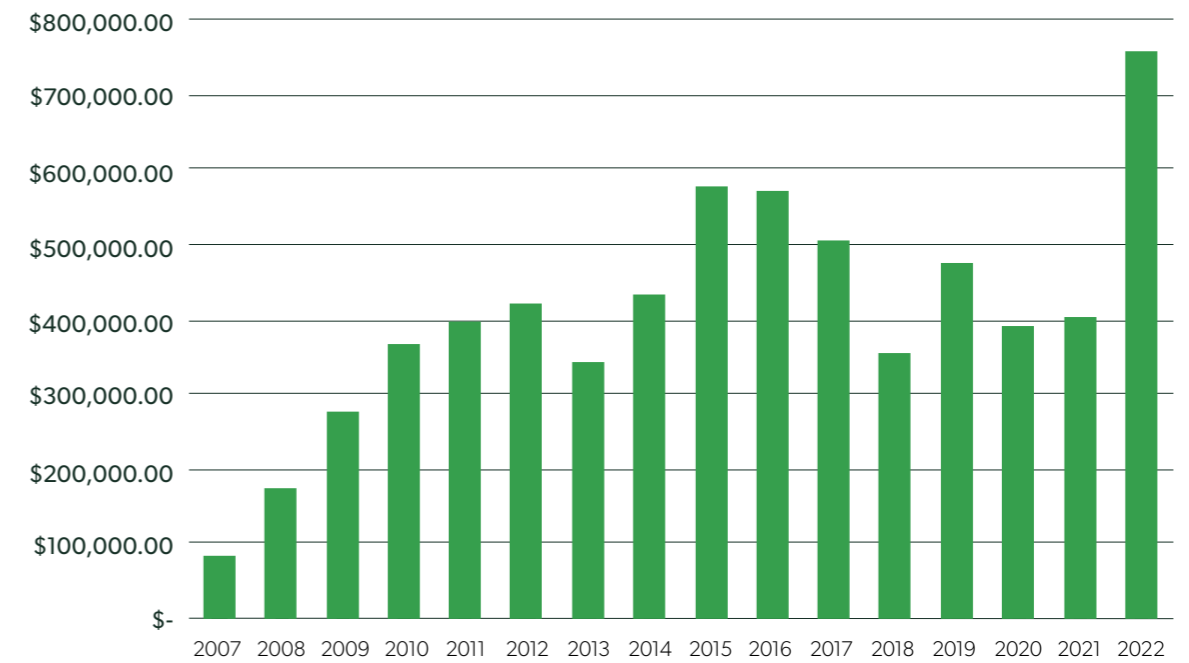

# FLOOD RESPONSE

**Outside of the Foundation's grant-making, the Brewery was responsible for many acts of giving during the flood crisis in NSW in early 2022.**

The Coopers team donated cases of beer to flood-affected communities, supporting their emergency response teams, local businesses and some customers severely affected by flood damage.

From an industry perspective, the Brewery is fortunate to be able to play a role in the continued support of their community of suppliers and clients.



## SUSTAINABLE *Giving*

The Sustainable Giving initiative provides \$150,000 in funding over three years to successful charities, which are selected after a two-stage application process and must identify with the focus area for the year.

'Family and community support based on Christian values' was the area of focus for 2021 and was awarded to **Prison Fellowship Australia** for its *Extraordinary Lives* project, which supports children with incarcerated parents.

*Extraordinary Lives* enables children to build resilience, achieve their goals, and increase their community connections, enabling their chance for future success. This vital program seeks to reduce children's sense of emotional and social isolation by building positive long-term relationships with their peers and mentors, and also by strengthening connections within their own family and school community.

Over the next three years, the charity aims to facilitate 120 children throughout Australia attending the Camp for Kids. Participants will engage in long-term mentoring relationships, receive educational support to increase positive engagement at school, and receive assistance with visits to their imprisoned parent.

Last year’s beneficiary, **Neuroblastoma Australia**, is already reporting great progress with research into treatment of this aggressive childhood cancer, which affects around 60 children each year and has only a 50% survival rate.

Collaborating with a research group in Holland, a number of drug combinations have been tested with the goal of finding a combination which is superior in outcome than current treatment options and is safer for the child.

**“Research funding is vital to change survival rates of neuroblastoma and unfortunately childhood cancers are often overlooked. Only 10% of Government research cancer funding goes to childhood cancers so community support, like that of the Coopers Foundation, is incredibly important.”**

**Australian Literacy & Numeracy Foundation (ALNF)**, 2019’s beneficiary, received its last instalment of funding in September 2021 and the Early Language & Literacy Central Goldfields Project has gone from strength to strength. Since receiving first funding, ALNF has trained, mentored and resourced 99 early childhood educators from 13 learning sites, supporting more than 800 children in the Maryborough region.

Results of phonological awareness testing – one of the strongest determinants of future reading success – are testament to the program’s ongoing success. Post-testing conducted in late 2021 confirmed that 93% of assessed children demonstrated improvement in phonological awareness. This is an outstanding achievement in an area where children must overcome a significant educational and social disadvantage and have experienced ongoing Covid-19 lockdowns and disruptions.



**“The ALNF’s Early Language and Literacy Course has been extremely beneficial for our educators. None of the information provided in Certificate 4 in [Early] Language and Literacy is taught in Diploma or Certificate 3 studies, so many educators enter the sector under prepared and under equipped to foster and develop the children’s language and literacy skills. Having the opportunity to participate in this type of course is not only beneficial to the educators here at the service, but the children we educate and the community they are growing up in.”**

# STAFF Giving

**Many Coopers Brewery employees donate to the *Foundation*, either through regular deduction from wages or as a one-off for a particular cause. This year, staff contributions totalled more than \$70,000.**

The Foundation is pleased to report that the following charities benefitted from donations in the name of Coopers Brewery staff this financial year:

- Teen Challenge SA
- The Warrior Woman Foundation

The Coopers Brewery Board and the Governors of the Foundation are delighted that Brewery employees choose to give so generously to the Foundation each year.



## TEEN CHALLENGE SA INC \$30,000

Teen Challenge SA provides a residential live-in rehabilitation program that offers young men freedom from drug and alcohol dependence and other life-controlling problems. Funding for this project helped purchase equipment, such as desks and laptops for students to take part in educational sessions.

Graduating students utilised the laptops in the initial phases of external studies including Cert IV in Youth Work, Cert IV in Other Drugs, and Cert IV in Mental Health. The laptops were extremely important during Covid-19 lockdowns as students were able to take part in remote learning through TAFE.

Teen Challenge CEO, Graham Ross, and program graduate, Darren Hiscock, spoke to supporters at the *Friends of the Foundation* event in October 2021.

**“Now, by the grace of God I’ve found my niche, I know who I am, where I’m going, and what I want out of life. I was someone who couldn’t string a sentence together and had no confidence. Teen Challenge SA has been with me every step of the way and provided me with opportunities that 12 months ago I only dreamt about. I’m currently studying for a career in youth work and have a supportive network of people around me.”**

**THE WARRIOR WOMAN FOUNDATION**  
**\$30,000**

This organisation provides holistic evidence-based support programs for under-represented vulnerable young women, 17-25 years of age at high risk of homelessness as they transition to independent living from the out-of-home-care system (ie foster homes).

The flagship *Young Warrior Woman Program* is a mentoring and psycho-educational program which provides connection, life skills education, and mental health support. Based on the Self Determination Theory, the *Young Warrior Woman Program* is designed to foster autonomy and financial independence. Together the mentors and mentees attend an intensive and structured six-month program consisting of weekly life skills education workshops and presentations. Additionally, each young woman participates in weekly one-to-one mentoring sessions.



**“Thanks to the support of the Coopers Foundation we now have 27 Wise Warrior mentors trained to support 27 young women in the Young Warrior Woman Program. At the beginning of the program only 48% of our participants say they have a safe adult in their lives that they can talk to. In the pilot of this project, this changed to 100% by the end of the program. Thank you so much for helping us empower vulnerable young women to become resilient, independent and capable of taking their place in the world”**

## *Giving*



**CAREWORKS SA (CHURCHES OF CHRIST IN SA & NT COMMUNITY CARE INC)**  
**\$50,000**

The *Strength in Numbers* program, funded by the Foundation, delivers financial counselling to women and families escaping domestic and family violence, in particular those with the residual debt from financial abuse which often accompanies these circumstances. People experiencing domestic violence frequently find themselves with children to care for, little or no financial resources or assets and unmanageable levels of debt



(often forced on them by the perpetrator). They frequently have little experience or knowledge of managing scarce resources, negotiating with creditors or navigating the maze of government entitlements and social supports. This project provides support and guidance for these women, helping them get back on top of their finances and live independently.

**“I had just left a domestic violence relationship and thought I would be in debt forever and struggle my whole life. When I first met the financial counsellor, Jacki made me feel at ease straight away, and for the first time I felt the anxiety lift. We met weekly, spoke twice weekly and developed a very trusting relationship. Jacki’s patience and kindness helped support me through this journey. She taught me how to budget and how to get back on track. Jacki honestly saved my life. I’m now teaching these skills to my four daughters.”**

**SALT CARE LTD**  
**\$50,000**

Salt Assisted Housing (SAH) provides a haven for those transitioning from crisis accommodation to independent living, with 15 homes in the Shoalhaven region of NSW. SAH offers a support system to clients for short, medium, or long-term stays dependent upon their specific needs. Each individual or family is supported, cared for, and connected to the Salt community. Funding from the Foundation has enabled Salt Care to sublet five additional houses prioritised for homeless mature aged women, and women with children who are escaping domestic and family violence.



**“The contribution from the Coopers Foundation made all the difference in being able to get the Salt Assisted Housing project up and running. We have had great successes with many people who are now living independently within our community and are in a position to give back to the community through gainful employment, volunteering, and community participation. They have grown through skill development and are much more resilient human beings (actually, they already were resilient – they just didn’t know it!)”**

# Chair's DISCRETIONARY FUND AND BIRTHDAY FUNDRAISING

This year, our Chair Melanie Cooper, celebrated a milestone birthday, asking for donations to the Foundation in place of gifts. The \$15,000 raised, along with \$5,000 from the Chair's discretionary fund, supported Devonport Chaplaincy – an organisation who serve the community of which our Chair was a part in the 1990's.



**DEVONPORT CHAPLAINCY INC**  
**\$20,000**

The Foundation's funding equipped chaplains to provide pastoral and practical support to thousands of students, parents and teachers in Tasmania's Northwest.

Services ranged from organising breakfast programs and emergency food hampers, to helping with homework and being a support and encouragement to students, teachers and parents struggling with a range of social, financial and emotional issues.

Extra care has been provided to the Hillcrest Primary School community in the wake of the December 2021 jumping castle tragedy, in which six children died and three were seriously injured. Chaplains have given comfort to grieving families and teachers through school and hospital visits, provided food, organised funerals in partnership with local churches, and offered ongoing care during the new school year, including to feeder high schools where graduating Hillcrest Year 6 students were enrolled.

# GENERAL Giving



**BAABAYN ABORIGINAL CORPORATION**  
**\$10,000**

Run by four Aboriginal Elders, this organisation serves its community in Mount Druitt by providing a place of healing, where Aboriginal people connect with culture and have a strong sense of belonging. The Elders required funding for a cleaner for the community centre, providing employment for a disadvantaged Aboriginal person as well as relieving the burden on ageing volunteers. When the requirements of the community centre changed, Baabayn was able to use the funds to hire young locals to develop a native garden surrounding the facility.

**“I love being around the Elders and giving them the respect that they deserve. I am learning lots of stuff and I also have a lot to give and I try to contribute as much as possible.”**

**THE BUTTERY LTD**  
**\$3,500**

*DRUMBEAT* is an evidence-based music therapy program used in conjunction with professional counselling for treating people who have mental health concerns, addiction and disability issues and/or those at risk. The funding from the Foundation purchased an additional set of African Djembe drums, allowing the program to be expanded to assist around 80 young people at locations across the NSW Northern Rivers Region. The drumming workshops assist by increasing communication, cooperation and collaboration, as well as focus, concentration, perseverance and commitment, which improves connection and a sense of belonging within the community.



**CHAPLAINWATCH INC**  
**\$30,000**

This organisation proactively patrols the entertainment precincts of Bundaberg and Gladstone overnight, watching out for those in crisis, at risk, or in need. The Foundation's funding helped establish two *NightSafe* fixed premises, 'Rest & Recovery' spaces that provide a safe place for vulnerable people. These facilities are staffed by volunteers, with a team member overseeing support and a registered nurse or paramedic on hand to administer first aid. Open from 10pm to 4am every Friday and Saturday night, the *NightSafe* centres care for people who need a breather during a night out, assistance to get home, or a safe space to rest and recover from the effects of drugs, alcohol, or anxiety.

**“Having the NightSafe Rest & Recovery Centre means that the people we care for can be supported in a private space, off the street and allows us to provide the best of care for whatever is going on for them. These facilities also provide a central space where we can work alongside the Police and the Paramedics.”**

**FRANKSTON LIFE COMMUNITY INC**  
**\$30,000**

The *Street Peace* program supports highly volatile at-risk young people who have lost the security of a stable home environment. Many are homeless and living a lifestyle leading to disastrous consequences. *Street Peace* volunteers are trained to engage with these youth in their street environment, carefully disrupting their mindsets and behaviours by building trusting relationships that address the trauma they have experienced. The aim is to see the troubled lives of these vulnerable youths transformed through relational connections that guide them into lives of purpose and hope.





**INALA MEALS ON WHEELS INC**  
**\$4,333**

A computer system upgrade was needed for Inala Meals on Wheels to continue providing the aged and vulnerable in its community with nutritious meals. This upgrade provided the volunteers and staff with the ability to serve over 450 meals weekly and be more efficient with general administration, allowing them to take on more clients and better adapt to the growing needs arising in the wider community.



**LOVE THIS CITY INC**  
**\$11,700**

Love This City's community centre 'The Junction' is utilised by a range of community groups throughout the week, with 400-450 families visiting the facility for a variety of sessions. As relationships with these families have developed, the team discovered commonly felt needs around parenting, relationships and finances. This funding provides courses, events and connection groups on marriage, parenting advice, and managing money, contributing to the organisation's mission to see a thriving, healthy and connected community.



**MARIONLIFE COMMUNITY SERVICES INC**  
**\$20,000**

*Discovering Strengths, Making Change* is a project aiming to identify and enact community solutions to society's pressing challenges in the suburb of Marion, SA. Over 12 months, MarionLIFE will reach out to over 300 members of its community through facilitated workshops, consultations, and events. This outreach will lead to the co-creation of new local-led projects that respond to the issues the community wants to pursue together; safety, mental health, youth, skills building, and parenting.

**"It can be rare to have the capacity not just to listen, but also to act on community-led ideas, ones that are community-centred, strengths based and actioned in a sustainable way. We extend our thanks to the Coopers Foundation for investing in the richness of community voices, that create meaningful outcomes to address gaps that local people see in their own community."**

**ONE DISEASE LTD**  
**\$15,000**

One Disease aims to eliminate Crusted Scabies in Australia, an extremely serious public health concern. The Foundation supported this project in 2017 when it launched and is proud to provide funding that will help the organisation finalise its operations now the mission is almost complete.

Working together with the Northern Territory's remote communities, One Disease is now focusing on embedding its disease elimination processes, to be sustainable within communities like the Daly River region, south of Darwin. Together with the NT Department of Health staff, One Disease teams visit house-to-house to help identify and treat scabies, and share its resources with families and health providers in the relevant Indigenous languages.

**"In one community alone, we expect to treat 300 hundred people for scabies and provide them with information on how to keep their homes scabies-free. We are very grateful for the Coopers Foundation's support for this project."**

**PRISON NETWORK LTD**  
**\$30,000**

The *Keeping Kids Connected* project has provided a range of support for children with mothers in prison, ensuring they remain connected and have opportunities to engage in meaningful activities together which strengthen the parent-child bond and build self-worth. Most women in Victoria's prisons have experienced childhood trauma and domestic violence, increasing the likelihood of involvement in criminal activity leading to prison time. When a parent is incarcerated the effect on children has a lifelong impact, creating cycles of intergenerational poverty and criminal activity. The funding will allow around 125 mothers and 175 children to take part in weekly playgroups, access a range of play equipment and craft resources, and provide transportation for children who could not otherwise visit their mother.

### THE SARGOOD FOUNDATION \$15,000

Funding for this project provided stays at *Sargood on Collaroy* for people who are living with the consequences of a Spinal Cord Injury and cannot rely on NDIS support for the service (children or those aged over 65).

A stay at *Sargood on Collaroy* brings huge benefits for these guests and their families, such as building independence, assisting in the development of meaningful connections, and helping to develop the skills needed to return to a full and rewarding life. The guests have access to nurses and support workers, an occupational therapist, exercise specialists, and the opportunity to participate in other group activities. A break at *Sargood on Collaroy* can provide companionship, help build confidence, optimism and a realisation of what is possible for those living with Spinal Cord Injury.

12-year-old Macaulay and his family enjoyed the kind and supportive care of the team in a non-hospital environment following the removal of a tumour from his spine and reoccurrence of brain cancer. The stay helped the family connect and come together.

**“People in hospital situations talk about working to achieve independence. At Sargood, the whole place is focused on actually making independence possible – from little things like the accessible dishwasher and power points to bigger things like easy beach access – we could all walk down with Macaulay in the beach chair. Just to be able to do this, made Macaulay feel so included. Nothing felt like a big deal, the staff were great at making everything feel so nice and normal.”**

### ST KILDA GATEHOUSE INC \$30,000

The Foundation funding enabled the *Young Women’s Project (YWP)* to provide one-on-one specialised outreach support for young women and girls aged 12-25, who are affected by and targeted for continued sexual, emotional, physical, and financial exploitation. This program offers holistic, evidence-based and trauma-informed support – including structured peer group work, sexual health education, worker supported school/employment attendance, advocacy and community linkages, emotional skills development, and practical assistance.

The *YWP* seeks to build resilience, wellbeing, improve coping skills, and assist young women by working in partnership with other service providers who refer young people they believe to be at risk.

**“The Young Women’s Project is the one place in my life that I can find some peace, be listened to and have the help I need. My worker helps me understand what healthy boundaries look like and ways I can keep safe. I’ve learnt some strategies to assist my mental health and wellbeing and I have just enrolled into school.”**

### SOLVE-TAD LTD (TECHNICAL AID TO THE DISABLED) \$20,000

The *Enabling All Lives* project improved the social cohesion, community inclusivity, and overall wellbeing of people living with a disability in NSW, by providing personalised equipment that enabled them to participate in community-based activities. Currently one in five people in NSW live with a disability and almost 80% of these people live with physical conditions. These conditions span a wide range and while commercial equipment is available, it is unable to serve everyone’s individual needs. The project first enabled eligible clients to connect with a Solve-TAD volunteer, who carried out an assessment of their needs and designed a piece of equipment that is fit-for-purpose, personalised, and safe.



**VP COMMUNITY HOLDINGS LTD**  
**\$25,000**

The Coopers Foundation assisted in the purchase of a refrigerated food transport vehicle to support the food delivery service currently providing meals to 125 families per week in the Brimbank, Manningham and Yarra Ranges region. The group is predominantly disadvantaged single parents and those from culturally and linguistically diverse or migrant backgrounds. The new truck provided an increase in capacity by 50% (to 6 tonnes of food each week) and will also help VP Community Holdings to distribute more fresh and refrigerated goods, reducing food waste and the risk of heat-damage in the hot summer weather.

Youth Options is an Adelaide-based charity with over 30 years of working with young people to transform their lives and lead a life with purpose. The organisation is working with over 250 young people (14-30 years old) experiencing high levels of complexity engaging with education and employment.

Funding helped purchase equipment for the *Working Futures Tech LIT* Lab and for the development of three learning streams around IT career readiness, digital literacy and technology enterprise. The project supports young people who don’t have ready access to modern technology and provides a high-quality learning environment consisting of PCs, printers, 3D printers, a laser engraver and fabric printers.
